

End of Year Report for Board of Directors The Sicilian Project

What started out as a project with a mission to teach English in Sicily quickly metamorphosed into an injection of hope and inspiration for the Sicilian families and students The Sicilian Project touched. In July 2012 the first group of 10 middle school students arrived in class eager to learn and committed to taking full advantage of the opportunity The Sicilian Project afforded them through the generosity of U.S. Italian-Americans and friends of Sicily. Although one of the prerequisites was previous study of the English language in school, along with a teacher's recommendation, it was quickly recognized that the students were near absolute beginners. With the creativity and skill of a seasoned teacher, Deb Bennett achieved significant success with the first group as evidenced in their development from having difficulty introducing themselves, to completing final projects involving conversations in real life situations. The videos chronicling the students' progress clearly illustrate the students' growth. By the finish of the first session each of the students was requesting to continue and additional parents and students were contacting Babilonia to apply for the program. Fortunately funding was available for both continuation of study for the first group and the addition of a second group of slightly older students. At present, The Sicilian Project has funded and completed five sessions in Taormina – three sessions by the first group and two by the second group and interest is still strong. The students understand that there are many other students anxious for the chance to replace those already in classes so they recognize the importance of producing results.

Site of classes - Babilonia - Center for Italian Language and Culture

Babilonia, an Italian Language school and cultural center programs are housed at "Casa Silva" an historic villa, just 200 meters from the Greek Theatre. The villa is hidden from view by an impressive stone wall that separates it from the steps of Via Timoleone. Built in 1811, in the park that at the time included the current public gardens, the property was owned by Professor Salvatore Cacciola, mayor of Taormina for many years during the 19th century and husband to Lady Florence Trevelyan, a cousin to the

English royal family. The villa still today boasts a luxurious botanical garden filled with citrus trees, Mediterranean plants, centuries-old palms, monkey puzzle trees and magnolias, as well as many other exotic trees and plants.

"Casa Silva" is protected by the Sovrintendenza alle Belle Arti (the National Agency for the preservation of Art and Monuments) which means it is historically registered as a national site to be preserved by law.

At "Casa Silva", BABILONIA hosts Book Presentations by authors, a Cine-Forum and in summertime, Painting and Sculpture exhibitions in its 1,000 square meters of botanical gardens. Additionally, Live Theatre Performances and Live Concerts (jazz and classical music) are offered. In the net-c@fé located in the WI-FI garden students enjoy their leisure time under the lush green trees to study, relax and meet their classmates.

A kitchen hosts cooking courses and students can buy coffee, cappuccino, fruit salad, croissants, cakes and typical Sicilian dishes in our cafeteria.

While maintaining its high caliber of academic teaching qualities, Babilonia is not just a language school, but truly a Cultural Center, open both to the local community and to international students who gain a wider cultural experience and the chance to easily interact and integrate with the local community.

Babilonia is accredited by:

All teachers at Babilonia are university graduates (most hold Master's Degrees) and speak at least one or two other foreign languages. Most have studied foreign languages at university and abroad and all have been trained to teach Italian as a foreign language. Teachers participate in an in-house teacher training program along with regularly scheduled teacher training seminars and workshops offered by the A.S.I.L.S., and other professional national and international organizations. English and Russian are also taught at Babilonia and the faculty for these languages are equally certified and trained.

After completing his university studies in Foreign languages (translation and interpreting) in Florence, being a native Sicilian, Adorno founded Babilonia - Center for Italian Language and Culture with the intention of offering those who love Italy and the Italian language and culture an opportunity to learn Italian in Sicily. Adorno's dream to teach Italian in the south of Italy was considered ridiculous at the time. Through Adorno's persistence, Babilonia now celebrates more than 20 years of passionate dedication to promoting Sicilian heritage and culture along with teaching the Italian language to numerous students from around the world.

The Sicilian Project Syllabus for 2012-2013 classes

The following are the main weekly points covered over the Fall and those which will be covered in Spring classes. The topics are adapted depending on how each individual group progresses. Discussion and pronunciation work will be a specific focus rather than some of the grammatical points as students receive very little work in these areas in the Sicilian school system. Themes/activities roll over to the following lesson when it is considered beneficial to the students.

Main points and grammatical /lexical areas covered:

- talking about your life and asking about others
- discussing interests & hobbies
- establishing class rules and the use of classroom language & vocabulary

- cultural and language differences

- study skills and discussion on ways we can improve our English Role play: enrolling in an American school

- talking about Taormina
- use adjectives & comparatives

- asking for and giving directions

4. All in a day's work

- talking about daily routines
- using time expressions
- weather and time vocabulary
- talking about jobs at home
- using the present simple tense

physical descriptions and clothing vocabulary

- talking about appearances
- introduction of the use of present continuous

Review of tenses and vocabulary

The last three lessons will be evaluated nearer to the time scheduled and will depend on how the courses have progressed and whether the students need more time to focus on one particular area.

Sample adjustment for levels: Lesson Making Plans – students planned a day out in the city of London using a tube map. Students were given a budget and planned accordingly. For homework they researched New York City to find out what to visit there. In the second group this was expanded to combine with the Sports lesson which described the rules and related vocabulary. Students bounced a ball around the class to learn verbs like 'pass', 'throw', 'bounce' etc. leading in to a study of the Olympics. Students then prepared presentations to promote Sicilian towns as possible host cities for the next Olympics. One group served as the International Olympic Committee and decided on the winner after questioning the applicants. Students presented their towns and logos for the games arguing the merits of the Sicilian town.

Faculty: Deborah (Debbie) Bennett

In addition to Debbie's university degrees, Debbie is certified by Cambridge CELTA, the most widely recognized teaching certificate in Teaching English as a Foreign Language. Since her original certification, Debbie has continued to advance her skills through workshops and conferences. Most recently, during the first two weeks of September Debbie completed a two week intensive course specifically focused on teaching children English as a Foreign Language resulting in her attaining the Young Learners Extension Certification. At Babilonia Debbie has been highly successful with her students of English which has earned her significant respect and warm appreciation by her students. The first group of Sicilian Project students arrived with limited knowledge and exhibited substantial improvement at their last class session. The 100%

student attendance of classes and enthusiastic continuation of the students' study is a testament to Debbie's outstanding teaching skills, her relevant lesson plans and her creative classroom exercise.

The Sicilian Project 2013

In 2013 The Sicilian Project will expand to include two more locations: Catania (Sicily's second largest city) and Gaggi (a rural agriculturally based town). Additionally in Taormina, current teachers of English in the Sicilian school system are being offered an intensive advanced English program. All three programs will begin the third week of January.

The targeted student population in Catania is young adults who live in an area of the city which has been challenged by unemployment and resulting criminal activity. This project is particularly important to Alessandro Adorno, the Director of Babilonia, as he is Catanese and is committed to improving the opportunities for these challenged youth. Classes will be housed in a youth hostel which is centrally located in the area targeted. The director of the hostel is enthusiastic about partnering with Babilonia in order to promote a positive change and optimism for the future among the youth.

Gaggi is a small town with a forward thinking mayor who is working on creating business opportunities in his town. Since Gaggi is significantly agricultural, the possibility of creating agritourism is being considered. For any business to be successful in attracting visitors, knowledge of the English language is required for workers. With the Schengen Agreement which allows for citizens of any of the 26 country participants to move and work easily in Italy, workers from outside of Italy are being hired to work in businesses in Sicily since many from Schengen countries have a strong background in the English language. Jobs that could be filled by Sicilians are going to non-Italians. Therefore the programs established by *The Sicilian Project* are critical in assisting to improve the employability of Sicilians not only globally, but also within Sicily.

The intensive teacher workshops are intended to increase the English language proficiency of the current teachers of English in Sicilian schools. This program will be organized so that it can also be delivered in the Catania location should funding become available. Teachers have already expressed an enthusiastic response to the proposal.

The beginnings of the *The Sicilian Project* have been resoundingly successful as evidenced by the significant improvement in English language skills in the early participants. It has also been successful in recharging the spirit of the Sicilian families who are benefiting. There is a genuine appreciation for the opportunities that the

organization is providing. Attached is a short, heartfelt note written by some of the students involved. Two short video thank you messages are also attached. Babilonia looks forward to partnering with *The Sicilian Project* in its mission.
